## SIMON ROBERTS

For the past 15 years, photographer Simon Roberts's work has explored Britain's complicated, sometimes paradoxical relationship with itself. His rich tableaux, often shot on large format from the roof of his motorhome, follow in the tradition of documentary photographers who've cast a quizzical eye over evolving British identity. Postimperial reality, the complications

of immigration, Brexit divisions, the possibilities of UK devolution – all are themes that Roberts explores with wit and complexity in his latest exhibition, *How did we get here? / Where do we go now?* 

Here, we see people in the sea at the Dickens Festival at Broadstairs in Kent, apparently the Victorian author's favourite seaside resort. "Often in my photographs I'm thinking about the landscape as a theatre set,"
Roberts tells me. Within that set,
people enact various ideas linked
to identity and notions of history
and culture. "There is always a cast
of characters in my photographs
who seem to portray a sense of a
performative Britishness," he says.

Roberts's images, which include video and installation, will be on show in Chester at a former H&M clothes store in the Grosvenor Shopping Centre. It seems fitting that an exhibition examining notions of Britishness should be held on the "British high street", yet another hotly debated symbol of the state of the nation.
